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Maximizing your OLLI at Drake Experience

OLLI at Drake Leadership Team Thursday, September 1 2–3:30 p.m.

What is OLLI? Find out how it works and how you can get involved. This single session class for both new and returning members will look briefly at the history of the RaySociety and the transition to OLLI at Drake University that has occurred since July 2021. We will look at OLLI at Drake's organizational structure, goals and programs. Eating Plant-Based: What, Why, and How Steve Bryce and Nancy Macklin Tuesdays, September 6, 13, 20 10-11:30 a.m.

Perhaps you've been hearing the words "plant-based diet" in the press, social media, or from friends or family. What does it mean? Why do people eat this way? And finally, how does one get started? This course answers those questions and provides nutritional, medical, and environmental insights. In the first two sessions, learn from a plant-based chef. In the third session, hear from a panel of people who follow a plant-based eating style.

Steve Bryce, with a BS in Animal Science from Iowa State University, worked in the meat industry for 28 years. He ran a restaurant in rural Minnesota. In 2018, he opened a plant-based café in Clive, Iowa. Currently, he owns Cottagescapes Bakery, a home-based bakery in Des Moines.

Nancy Macklin is a food and nutrition professional with experience as a clinical dietitian, food service director, and test kitchen professional. She has extensive recipe development experience, and most recently developed over 1,000 whole food plant-based recipes for a national publication.

The Culture and History of Inuit Art

The Inuit of the Canadian Arctic have created art forms of striking imagery and exquisite beauty, deep spirituality, and occasional whimsy. Through powerful artistic expression, the Inuit's unique way of life, their traditional myths and beliefs, the animals of the Arctic spring vividly to life. Using a wide variety of carvings, prints and cultural artifacts, this class will examine and celebrate some of the major regional and individual artists in sculpture and graphic arts, including the cultural and historical background of Inuit art. We will also view videos of Inuit culture and lifestyle as well as Inuit artists at work.

Chris Rinner is a retired educator and school improvement consultant. He is currently an adjunct professor in the College of Education at Drake University. In addition, he enjoys story-telling. Over many years, his appreciation of Inuit art has resulted in a deeper understanding of Inuit art and culture as well as a collection of several hundred original carvings and prints. The recent high inflation isn't something the US has experienced since the 1970s, a decade often characterized by high energy prices, a loss of faith in American government, cheap monetary policy, and dramatic cultural change. While many of the 1970s themes sound familiar, and there are lessons to be learned from the past, the 2020s are different. This installment of the Economic Roundtable will take a deep dive into the lessons learned by policy makers in the past, and what can and cannot be applied to the global economy of today. Join in an interesting and engaging discussion rooted in a look at the economic data as the Roundtable tries to "get the skinny" on the current state of the economy.

Thomas Root holds four degrees including a PhD in economics from the University of Kansas. He has been teaching in the primary area of finance in the College of Business and Public Administration at Drake since 1999. In addition to being an active member of the academic community, he maintains a close connection to the private sector through both consulting and the delivery of certificate programs taught to area business leaders through Drake's Center for Professional Studies. Root also holds a visiting professorship at Makerere University Business School (MUBS) in Uganda.

Des Moines Talks: People You Should Know

It's important to recognize and celebrate those in our community who 'make a difference' ... both in our community, and sometimes in the world. But does one need to be famous, wealthy or powerful? Sometimes it is all of those elements. Other times, it is 'ordinary' people doing extraordinary things, often in a quiet way – with fanfare, or without. During this semester, we recognize folks who have done great things, often without recognition and yet are celebrated by both their peers and folks who recognize their contributions that enhance the world we live in.

Session 1: From the Mississippi to the Mekong: Over 50 Years of Building Peace Through Agriculture

Ambassador Kenneth Quinn will recount experiences dealing with Torture, Terrorism, Refugees, Genocide, and Ending Hunger and Poverty during his 32-year global odyssey as an American diplomat serving: in Vietnam during the war; on Henry Kissinger's National Security Council staff at the White House; in Governor Bob Ray's office; at the United Nations in Vienna; and as American Ambassador to Cambodia; followed by his two decades of leading Norman Borlaugh's World Food Prize in Des Moines.

A graduate of Loras College in Dubuque, Ambassador Quinn holds a master's degree in Political Science from Marquette University and a PhD in International Relations from the University of Maryland. He was only the 23rd recipient of the lowa Medal, the state's highest citizen award. Other honors include: the State Department Award for Heroism; being the only civilian to ever earn the Army Air Medal for participating in helicopter combat operations; and acting as interpreter in Vietnamese for President Ford.

The tour includes the Polk County Court House which has 28 face carvings; the imposing rams' heads on the Performing Arts Building on Locust; the gargoyle-like creatures on the Suite of 800 Locust, Lincoln High School, and the former French Way Cleaners and much more. Jan will discuss the history, restorations and discuss connections with other carvings from around the world.

Jan Fleming is the author of *Grotesques in Des Moines* ... *Iowa and Abroad, Song of Iowa* and *Rejection – It Doesn't Exist.* After receiving her Masters of Music from Northwestern University, Jan sang opera, oratorio, recital and concert in Chicago and Washington, DC. Finding Long-Term Care Living Arrangements, Medicaid Eligibility, and Medicare Programs and Benefits

September 12 – Someone in your life may need help. It may be parents who are unable to care for themselves or their spouses. It may be your husband, wife or grandparent. Whoever it is, when you get to this point there are a lot of questions about where the person can get the help they need. This session will address:

- Your living and care options?
- Where do you go for care?
- · Who can help?
- · How much will this cost?

September 19 – The Medicaid presentation will educate people about:

- Eligibility requirements for Medicaid for nursing home and other long-term care expenses.
- Asset and income protections for the Medicaid recipient's spouse.
- Options for spending down assets to qualify for Medicaid.
- Protecting the home and other assets from lowa's estate recovery law.
- Avoiding illegal asset transfers that would affect Medicaid eligibility.

September 26 – The Medicare session will discuss the benefits and costs of Medicare Parts A and B; Medicare Supplement plans and costs; prescription drug plan benefits, and the annual plan comparison procedures. The discussion will also cover Medicare Advantage plans, contrasting them with traditional Medicare.

Becky Orr Montgomery's path to founding Senior HomeFinder of lowa started in 2003, when her mother was diagnosed with Alzheimer's disease. She immersed herself in all the material she could find related to all forms of dementia, including Alzheimer's disease, and the toll it was taking on both her mother and father.

The process of finding a comfortable, safe and caring community for her parents was overwhelming. During

the time her parents lived in their Senior Community, Becky met many family members of the other residents. Many shared their stories of the difficult decisions they had to make and the stress and confusion associated with those decisions.

Becky's passion is working with seniors and their families and she wants to spearhead the movement of helping people navigate through this major change in their lives.

Scott Hartsook was the Managing Attorney of Iowa Legal Aid's Legal Hotline for Older Iowans from 1997 to 2018. Scott graduated from the University of Iowa College of Law in 1977 and is a frequent speaker about Medicaid. He currently practices part-time in Des Moines, helping people with Medicaid and other elder law issues.

Ken Popken is a graduate of the University of Nebraska and has an MBA from the University of Iowa. He helped design, install, and administer employer sponsored retirement plans for clients of Equitable of Iowa [1969 to 1988] and The Principal Financial Group [1988 to 1998]; conducted insurance license training sessions for prospective insurance agents [1998 to 2006]; served as a volunteer for Senior Health Insurance Information Program (SHIIP) [2006 to present]. Ken's SHIIP activity consists of conducting Welcome to Medicare Seminars and counseling individuals about their Medicare options.

Iowa Land Owners and Farmers Working Together for

Conservation

Location: Zoom AND Tesdell Century Farm, Slater Cost: \$30

Join Lee Tesdell for this informative look at conservation farming in the 21st Century.

Week one: What are in-field practices and how do they benefit the long-term value of farmland? Discussion will include: no-till/strip-till and cover crops.

Week two: : What are edge-of-field practices and how do they help improve water quality and soil health? Discussion will include: buffer strips, wood-chip bioreactors, saturated buffers, prairie strips, terraces, and waterways.

Week three: Field trip to Tesdell Century Farm, Slater, IA (weather permitting). This will take approximately two hours. The farm is located 22 miles north of the Drake campus.

On this farm tour participants will meet with Mike Helland, row-crop operator, and Lee Tesdell, land owner, to learn about: in-field practices, edge-of-field practices, and ways of discussing conservation with your farmer operator.

Lee Tesdell owns Tesdell Century Farm which has been in his family since 1884, and is an emeritus professor, Minnesota State University in Mankato.

Bruce Martin

Bruce Martin is professor emeritus, English, and the Ellis and Nelle Levitt Professor of English at Drake. He taught at Drake from 1967 to 2006, offering courses in 19th and 20th century British literature and literary theory. In 1986–1987, he held a Fulbright lectureship at the National University of Singapore, where he later served as visiting professor of English. Subsequently he was awarded Fulbright lectureships to South Korea and Madagascar.

Sherlock Holmes Lives! Rod Henshaw, Michael Couvillon Wednesdays, September 14, 21, 28 10-11:30 a.m.

Sherlock Holmes is the most enduring character in all of fiction. The first tales about Sherlock and his companion Dr. John Watson appeared in 1887, followed by 60 additional adventures. Today, Sherlock is a global cultural phenomenon that continues to engage readers,

through television and film, and almost every other form of media.

This three-part course will explore how Conan Doyle created the Holmes stories, and what led to their enduring presence and success over the last 130 years. This course will be a highly interactive and visual journey through the life and times of Holmes – through books, illustrations, film, and television. Along the way, course participants will engage in Sherlockian methods of investigation and reasoning, and conclude with a look at some rare archival material from around the globe.

Rod Henshaw, Professor of Librarianship, served as Dean of Drake's Cowles Library from 1996 to 2018. He retired from Drake in August 2020. He also served in leadership positions at Penn State, and Emory University. Drawing on a lifetime of Librarianship, book collecting, and immersion in book culture, Rod will take us on a journey through this portion of Book Land. He has been an active Sherlockian, and a member of science fiction fan culture. Dean Emeritus Henshaw has donated to Drake his Sherlock Holmes, Ray Bradbury, and science fiction collection

Michael Couvillon is a professor of education at Drake University. His areas of expertise are emotional and behavioral disorders (E/BD), functional behavioral assessments and behavior intervention plans, policy and standards on the use of time-out seclusion, and juvenile justice. He has a BA from the University of Nebraska-Kearney, MEd from the University of North Texas, and PhD from the University of North Texas.

For the Love of Show Business: Broadway, Theater, and Love Stories through the Decades

Since before Shakespeare, theater has told stories not only about love, but about the love of theater. This course will look at three Broadway productions that have a love of show business at their heart: Funny Girl, Billy Elliot and Indecent. Funny Girl, the musical that launched Barbara Streisand's career, looks at the career of the vaudeville legend Fanny Brice; we will watch and discuss the recent production starring Sheridan Smith. Billy Elliot, an adaption of the beloved film with music by Elton John, follows a boy in British coal country who dreams of being a dancer. And Paula Vogel's award-

winning *Indecent* looks at the story of Scholem Ash's world-wide Yiddish theater hit, *God of Vengeance*, through the lens of the history of the Jewish people in the first half of the 20th Century.

What all three share is a love of performance, of theater, of show business, of the power of communal storytelling. They take fascinatingly different paths to get to their conclusions. The class will look at the messages, themes, and theatrical strategies these three shows deploy to create impact with audiences and share their stories, with an eye to understanding both the tactics and history around these choices. All three shows are available on **broadwayhd.com**. Class participants can engage a 7-day free trial, with monthly billing they cancel after the class, should they so choose.

Matthew McIver is a writer, director and actor, and the Artistic Director of Iowa Stage Theatre Company. Matthew served as Founding Artistic Director of the Des Moines Social Club for five years, overseeing theater and a wide range of other programming. He is an active member in the community, having served on the board of Bravo Greater Des Moines, the After School Arts Program, Hoyt Sherman Place, and the Iowa Cultural Coalition.

The Iowa Division of Criminal Investigation Criminalistics Laboratory is entrusted by statutes to provide technical assistance to the criminal justice system in the investigation of criminal matters. This technical assistance involves the recognition, recovery, packaging, marking, sealing and analysis of physical evidence, preparation of technical reports of the analyses, and court testimony. Our tour will allow us to see each facet of the Lab. Laboratory staff also participate in the training of law enforcement officers in advanced evidence handling procedures and the processing of some crime scenes. Join us as we learn about and tour the Division of Criminal Investigation Laboratory.

Dennis Goldford has been at Drake since 1985. He received his BA in political science and philosophy from the University of Michigan, an MLitt (Master of Letters) in philosophy from Oxford University, and an MA and PhD in political science from the University of Chicago. Professor Goldford teaches in the areas of political theory and constitutional law.

Session Two (September 28) Doug Gross and Tom Henderson

Douglas E. Gross received his BA from Iowa Wesleyan College and his JD from Drake. He is a member of BrownWinick law firm. Doug has extensive campaign experience in Iowa, including involvement in numerous successful gubernatorial, congressional, and state legislative campaigns. Among other positions, he served as Chief of Staff to Governor Terry Branstad and Administrative Assistant to Governor Robert D. Ray.

Tom Henderson has his undergraduate and law degrees from Drake and is an attorney and member at Whitfield and Eddy Law. He is an active participant in Democratic Party politics, and his leadership positions in the party have included nineteen years as Polk County Democratic Chair, a member of the lowa delegation to the Democratic National Convention in 1996 and 2000, and Chair of the lowa Democratic Party Rules Committee.

Dave Price is WHO-TV's Political Director, host of the Sunday morning show "The Insiders" and anchors Channel 13 News on weekend evenings. Dave left St. Louis radio to earn his Master's Degree at the prestigious University of Missouri-Columbia. Dave has earned a national Emmy, Edward R. Brianne Pfannenstiel is the chief political reporter for the Des Moines Register. She was a moderator for the 7th Democratic Debate in January 2020 with Wolf Blitzer and Abby Phillip. She has degrees in Journalism and Italian Language and Culture from the University of Kansas.

O. Kay Henderson, Radio lowa News Director. Covering politicians was apparently Kay's destiny from day one. She was born on election day. During her years at lowa State University, Kay served as a statehouse correspondent for WOI-AM, the NPR affiliate in Ames. In 1987, Kay became one of the three founding members of the Radio lowa network newsroom. In 1994, she became the network's news director.

Lynn Kuhn grew up in small town lowa spending much time in the yard with nine siblings; playing, doing garden chores with Mom, and relaxing in the sun. Looking back, these outdoor childhood experiences shaped her design sensibilities and landscape ethic.

After graduating from Iowa State University with a landscape architecture degree, Lynn spent over 25 years in the nursery industry as a landscape architect, creating beautifully landscaped spaces. She was the first Executive Director of the Brenton Arboretum near Dallas Center, Iowa. In 2015, Lynn created Outdoor Transformations, a small design firm focused on outdoor spaces that where not only beautiful, but also conversational, where people can connect with their friends, families and themselves.

How Can I Make a Difference in the Climate Crisis?

Personal Transportation Without Gasoline

This class offers the resources to help you transition from using cars and trucks that use fossil fuel (such as gasoline) to electric vehicles powered by a wind turbine or solar panels. Twenty-three percent of CO2 emissions come from vehicles. Everything we can do to minimize CO2 emissions helps the environment.

Heat Wave: Cause and Survival

Sooner or later, we will experience an extended heat wave due to our warming climate. This class explores the science, the meteorology, and most importantly, how to stay cool in high heat and humidity, even when the power fails.

Water, water, everywhere (from Air)

A warming climate increases the probability of flooding and drought. The need for fresh clean water is also increasing due to the changing climate. This class explores the science of extracting water from the atmosphere and offers instruction as to what we might pursue individually or in small groups.

Solar Power: Reducing your Carbon Footprint

We can reduce our carbon footprint by powering our electronics, vehicles and homes with renewable energy, namely solar energy. In this class, we explore the availability of small portable solar batteries, solar chargers, solar panels (sources, costs, installation), and community solar and wind farms offered by municipalities and power companies.

Sam Wormley is a retired associate scientist and principal investigator, CNDE/IPRT/AL at Iowa State and taught as an adjunct professor of astronomy at Marshalltown Community College for 17 years. Wormley regularly teaches science and technology classes for OLLI at Iowa State and OLLI at Drake.

How to Save the World David Skidmore Fridays, October 7, 14 2-3:30 p.m.

This course examines the role that transnational advocacy networks (TANs) play in world politics. TANs are political networks of non-governmental organizations (NGOs) and activitists that focus on specific issues and span two or more countries. TANs seek social change consistent with core principled ideas through coordinated campaigns, such as those aimed at banning landmines, addressing climate change, ending child labor, and ensuring corporate accountability. TANs provide a bottom-up alternative to existing globalization, push governments to cooperate to solve global problems and defend democratic institutions. TANs, both historically and in contemporary times, provide an antidote to cynicism, apathy, and helplessness. This course will incorporate student presentations of case study research on TAN campaigns carried out for Skidmore's Spring 2022 course on this topic.

David Skidmore is a professor of political science at Drake University. He received his PhD from Stanford University and taught at Hamilton College and the University of Notre Dame before arriving at Drake in 1989. During the 1996–97 academic year, he taught at the Johns Hopkins-Nanjing University Center for Chinese and American Studies in Nanjing, China. He also served as a Fulbright Scholar based at the University of Hong Kong in 2010-2011. Skidmore served as Director of the Principal Financial Group Center for Global Citizenship (2002-2017) and the Nelson Institute for Diplomacy and International Affairs (2012-2017), both at Drake University.

Stealth is the ultimate game of hide and seek for our military. Stealth is "the" major capability that the US has that elevates and distinguishes the US defense force from all other countries. This course will help you understand the major technologies and components of creating "stealth", the evolution of stealth platforms since World War II, and the latest stealth platform – the F-35 Joint Strike Fighter. The F-35 is the largest and most expensive program in the US Department of Defense, and is being purchased by the UK, Italy, the Netherlands, Australia, Canada, Norway, Denmark, Japan, Singapore, Israel, and Poland.

John Hickok has the following degrees: BS engineering/ nuclear physics (USNA), MS in aero engineering, and MBA (NPGS). He retired after a 48-year career in the Navy (A-6 Intruder Naval Flight Officer and RAF Buccaneer Weapon Systems Officer, acquisition assignments including top secret stealth programs and Navy avionics systems) – and Office of the Secretary of Defense (Sr. Professor at Defense Acquisition University, Chief Knowledge Officer).

The Martin Bucksbaum Distinguished Lecture Series speaker at Drake University this fall is Ambassador Marie Yovanovich.

The former US Ambassador to Ukraine and bestselling author of the memoir *Lessons from the Edge* shares insights on the region and the current crisis as well as experiences from her 33-year career in the US Foreign Service.

Marie Yovanovitch served three times as US Ambassador, most recently in Kyiv as the US Ambassador to Ukraine. Previously, she served as US Ambassador to the Kyrgyz Republic (2005–2008) and the Republic of Armenia (2008–2011). She retired from the Foreign Service in 2020 and is currently a Senior Fellow at the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace and a non-Resident Fellow at the Institute for the Study of Diplomacy at Georgetown University.

Born into a family that survived both Soviet and Nazi terror before emigrating to the US, Yovanovitch rose to the top of her profession in the crucible of the former USSR. Following early assignments in Moscow, London, Ottawa, and Mogadishu, she served as Deputy Director of the Russia Desk and then, as a career member of the Senior Foreign Service, she was named Deputy Chief in Ukraine. Within the Department of State, Ambassador Yovanovitch has worked on the Russia desk, the Office of European Security Affairs, and the Operations Center. She also served as the Dean of the School of Language Studies at the Foreign Service Institute, US Department of State and as the Deputy Commandant and International Advisor at the Dwight D. Eisenhower School for National Security and Resource Strategy, National Defense University.

Ambassador Yovanovitch earned the Senior Foreign Service Performance Award eight times and the State Department's Superior Honor Award on nine occasions. She is the recipient of two Presidential Distinguished Service Awards and the Secretary's Diplomacy in Human Rights Award. Following her retirement, Ambassador Yovanovitch received the Trainor Award for Excellence in the Conduct of Diplomacy from Georgetown University, the inaugural Richard G. Lugar Award from Indiana University, the 2020 PEN/Benenson Courage Award from Pen/America, the Morgenthau Award from the Armenian Assembly of America, the American Spirit Award for Distinguished Public Service from the Common Good, and the Paul H. Douglas Award for Ethics in Government.

In early 2022, Marie Yovanovitch's memoir, *Lessons From The Edge*, was an instant *New York Times* bestseller. The late Madeleine Albright called the book "A brilliant, engaging, and inspiring memoir from one of America's wisest and most courageous diplomats – essential reading for current policymakers, aspiring public servants, and anyone who cares about America's role in the world."

What Episodes in Asia's Past Changed the Course of its History?

Paul Morris has degrees in economics and business, and most recently an MA in History at the University of Iowa. He has served as the Chief Information Officer at Tufts, Emory and Drake Universities and has also taught numerous classes for OLLI, primarily in history.
