#### General Douglas MacArthur In Japan, 1945-1951 Paul Morris Tuesdays, September 3, 10, 17, 24 2-3:30 p.m. Class delivery mode: HYBRID Location: Harkin Institute or Zoom Cost: \$45

Taking command in Tokyo in 1945, MacArthur effectively, if autocratically, directed the reconstruction of a Japanese economy and society devastated by WWII. But he utterly failed to prepare for the Communist invasion of South Korea in 1950. He then sparked an international crisis by publically advocating his use of atomic weapons against China. As the world teetered on the brink of a new world war, he was fired by President Truman, and his years in Japan ended in disgrace.

**Paul Morris** has degrees in economics and business, and an MA in history at the University of Iowa. He has served as the Chief Information Officer at Tufts, Emory and Drake Universities and has also taught numerous classes for OLLI, primarily about history.

## A Day in the Life of a Medical Examiner

**Dr. Kelly Kruse Wednesday, September 4 10–11:30 a.m.** Class delivery mode: HYBRID Location: Harkin Institute or Zoom Cost: \$15

You've seen them on crime shows and even heard them mentioned on local television shows, but exactly what is a medical examiner? Dr. Kelly Kruse, an Associate State Medical Examiner at the lowa Office of the State Medical Examiner, will give you a glimpse into this important profession. Learn about the structure of lowa's medical examiner system, criteria for performing autopsies, intricacies of the autopsy process and its significance, and daily responsibilities of a medical examiner. Dr. Kruse will also share insights into determining cause and manner of death through case examples.

**Dr. Kelly Kruse** holds a Bachelor's of Science degree in anthropology from Tulane University and Master of Public Health and Doctor of Medicine degrees from St. George's University. She completed an anatomic and clinical pathology residency program in New Jersey and a forensic pathology fellowship program at the Office of the Chief Medical Examiner of Maryland before joining the Iowa Office of the State Medical Examiner in 2018. To date, she has conducted approximately 2,000 autopsies, testified in multiple nationally televised murder trials, and served as a consultant for Law & Crime Network.

## The World in Review

**Ellen Pirro Wednesdays, September 4, October 2, November 6, December 4 2–3:30 p.m.** Class delivery mode: HYBRID Location: Harkin Institute or Zoom Cost: \$45

Join Ellen for a monthly update on the current happenings in international relations and European politics. This class examines the resurgence of a world organized in major poles – three at this time – who contend with each other for dominance. The unipolar world centered around the United States, from 1989 (the end of the Cold War) to roughly 2008, is gone. The United States faces major challenges from Russia and China, each of whom has global ambitions. Their goals will be examined and we will look to the future in this fastevolving situation.

**Ellen Pirro** teaches political science at Iowa State University and specializes in international relations and European politics. She has also taught at Drake. She founded and directed the Carrie Chapman Catt Center for Women and Politics at ISU. She was named teacher of the year at ISU in 2012, and in 2014 she received the university's International Service Award. Ellen has coauthored a book *The European Union & the Member States* with retired Drake professor Eleanor Zeff.

#### MOVIE EVENT – Varsity Cinema The Birds (1963) Carl Johnson hosts discussion after movie Thursday, September 5 2-4:30 p.m.

Nominated for an Academy Award for Best Effects, Special Visual Effects, this film from 1963 by Alfred Hitchcock was Tippi Hedren's first credited screen role. The great film composer, Bernard Herrmann, in his 7th collaboration with Hitchcock, is listed as "sound consultant." Find out more about this and how Hitchcock created his frightening imagery based on the story by Daphne Du Maurier. This film has impactful camerawork, for which Hitchcock is famous, as he builds suspense along with a multi-layered psychological drama.

**Carl Johnson** received his undergraduate degree in music education and his teaching credential from UCLA, then spent 19 years teaching high school instrumental music in California. He moved to Urbandale in 1992 and received his master's degree in conducting from Drake University in 1994. He has taught classes in numerous adjunct and part-time capacities ever since. He is the music director/conductor of the Des Moines Community Orchestra, conducted annual musicals with the Urbandale Community Theatre, and is the assistant director of the Greater Des Moines Community Band.

Dennis Kelly, from OLLI at Drake, will interview Terry Strada on Zoom about her personal connection and life mission connected to the tragic events of September 11.

**Terry Strada** is the national chair of 9/11 Families United. For over two decades she has worked tirelessly with Congress, Administrations, the Department of Justice, and the media as a dedicated activist and leader, coordinating and mobilizing 9/11 families and survivors into action. Her mission is to seek justice and accountability for the murder of her husband and all those murdered and injured on 9/11, and to deter future terrorist attacks by establishing legal consequences for nations that support terrorism.

**Ben McCollum**, architect to the most successful men's college basketball dynasty of the last decade, was named men's basketball head coach at Drake University, Athletics Director Brian Hardin announced on Monday, April 1. A native of Storm Lake, Iowa, McCollum arrived in Des Moines after spending the past 15 seasons as the head coach at NCAA Division II power Northwest Missouri State University. While in Maryville, he won four national championships (2017, 2019, 2021, 2022). Born in Iowa City, McCollum was raised in Storm Lake, Iowa, and graduated from St. Mary's High School in 1999. He and his wife, Michelle, are the proud parents of two sons, Peyton and Tate, and a daughter Grace Ann.

Allison Pohlman, a longtime associate head coach and one of the primary architects of the Drake women's basketball program's renaissance, was named the Suzie Glazer Burt Head Women's Basketball Coach at Drake University on April 18, 2021 and is entering her third season leading the Bulldog women with a career record of 71-29. Along the way, the Bulldogs won the program's 10th MVC Regular Season championship, and eighth MVC Tournament championship, the second in a row for Drake. The Wellsburg, Iowa native and her husband, Kirk, have triplet daughters, Quinn, Rubie and Sidny. Pohlman holds a bachelor's of science in Dietetics and a master's degree in Health Education from UNI.

**Dennis Thompson** has been active in Central Iowa birding circles for over 35 years. He has served as president of the Des Moines Audubon Society several times and has led monthly field trips for that organization for the past 25 years. Dennis has also been the compiler for the Des Moines Audubon Christmas Bird Count since the mid-80s. Dennis is retired from Wells Fargo.

# SESSION 1: Weight Loss ... What are my options? A Primary Care Perspective

Weight loss is a topic of conversation that regularly comes up in a family medicine office visit. This discussion is around the healthy management of movement, nutrition, and of course...OZEMPIC. The course will review several dietary approaches to nutrition and a review of the primary foods considered when discussing mangement of weight. **Dr. Seth Quam** has practiced Family Medicine for 12 years. A local guy, having grown up in Des Moines, his interests include cardiometabolic health, sports medicine, pediatrics/adolescent health. He is married and has three daughters. Outside of teaching and treating patients, Dr. Quam enjoys time with his family, Cyclone sports, cycling.

# SESSION 2: Strategies for Managing Anxiety and Depression

Anxiety and depressive symptoms are common. In this lecture, we will discuss strategies and resources to help manage these symptoms.

Abigail Schiltz joined Des Moines University (DMU) Behavioral Health Clinic as a Physician Assistant in 2021. She earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Human Physiology at the University of Iowa and a Master's Degree in Physician Assistant Studies at DMU. She then served as a Physician Assistant family medicine resident at the University of Iowa Hospitals and Clinics (UIHC), where she treated patients of all ages.

# SESSION 3: Footloose and Fancy-Free: Living with Arthritis of the Foot & Ankle

Some degree of degenerative joint disease is an inevitable part of aging, but it doesn't have to hold you back. This lecture will review the causes of arthritis of the foot and ankle, as well as take an in-depth look at various preventative measures and treatment options.

**Dr. Ashley Dikis** joined DMU as an assistant professor in 2020 and currently acts as the clinical department chair for the DMU Foot & Ankle Clinic. She earned a bachelor's degree in biological sciences from Purdue University, podiatric medical degree from Des Moines University, and completed foot and ankle surgical residency training at the University of Pittsburgh.

### Life, The Universe, and Everything (6 sessions) Sam Wormley

Mondays, September 9, 16, 23, 30, and October 7, 14 2-3:30 p.m. Class delivery mode: ZOOM Cost: \$45

The Hitchhiker's Guide to the Galaxy is a comic science fiction series created by Douglas Adams, where 42 is the answer to the Ultimate Question of Life, The Universe, and Everything. This OLLI course is rather ambitious, as it attempts to answer some pretty big questions in science. To make this a manageable OLLI course we have divided 42 weeks by seven so that we have just six weeks of class. Furthermore each class is introduced by a 2-minute video featuring particle physicist, David Kaplan describing the subject matter and basic principles.

#### Specific topics to be covered:

- 1. What Happens if You Fall Into a Black Hole?
- 2. Where Did the Universe Come From?
- 3. How Does Life Come From Randomness?
- 4. How Did Life Begin on Earth?
- 5. How Symmetry Shapes Nature's Laws
- 6. Is That 'Bump' a New Particle?

Sam Wormley has degrees in mathematics and electrical engineering and taught as an adjunct professor of astronomy at Marshalltown Community College for seventeen years. Wormley regularly teaches science and technology for OLLI at Drake and at Iowa State.

This course introduces the practice of Tai Chi with a gentle, non-taxing routine that includes elements of Qigong, Yang style Tai Chi, and movement training. There are many claims about the positive benefits of Tai Chi, and it is our hope that with regular practice, you will notice a difference in overall flexibility, fitness, and ability to relax. If any parts of our routine are not comfortable, you do not need to do them. If you have any health concerns about taking the class, we recommend that you consult your physician.

**Daniel Alexander** is a retired Drake mathematics professor. He has practiced Tai Chi for about 20 years and has co-facilitated a local Tai Chi group since 2018.

**Bruce Martin** is Professor Emeritus of English, and Ellis and Nelle Levitt Professor of English at Drake. He taught at Drake from 1967 to 2006, offering courses mostly in 19th and 20th century British literature and literary theory. In 1986–1987, he held a Fulbright lectureship at the National University of Singapore, where he later served as visiting Professor of English. Subsequently, he was awarded Fulbright lectureships to South Korea and Madagascar.

## **China From Two Perspectives**

Ambassador Kenneth Quinn Ambassador Terry Branstad Wednesdays, September 11, 18 10–11:30 a.m.

#### SESSION 1: Ambassador Kenneth Quinn

From his first visit to China in 1979, when he accompanied Governor Robert Ray shortly after the establishment of diplomatic relations, through his scheduled travel in October to co-chair the World AgriFood Innovation Conference in Beijing, Ambassador Ken Quinn will have visited China over 20 times. He has done so as a diplomat, President of the World Food Prize and a participant in the Iowa-Hebei Sister State/ Sister Province relationship. During that almost five decade long period, he has observed the dramatic transformation of China, both internally as well as in terms of its relationship to other countries in the Asia-Pacific region. He feels privileged to have had interactions with President Xi Jinping, Paramount Leader Deng Xiaoping, and China's greatest agricultural scientist, Professor Yuan Longping. He will recount experiences dealing with torture, terrorism, refugees, genocide, and ending hunger and poverty during his 32-year global odyssey as an American diplomat serving: in Vietnam during the war; on Henry Kissinger's National Security Council staff at the White House; in Governor Bob Ray's office; at the United Nations in Vienna; and as American Ambassador to Cambodia; followed by his two decades of leading Norman Borlaug's World Food Prize in Des Moines.

Ambassador Kenneth Quinn is a graduate of Loras College in Dubuque, holds a master's degree in Political Science from Marquette University and a PhD in International Relations from the University of Maryland. He was only the 23rd recipient of the Iowa Medal, the state's highest citizen award. Other honors include: the State Department Award for Heroism; being the only civilian to ever earn the Army Air Medal for participating in helicopter combat operations; and acting as interpreter in Vietnamese for President Ford.

#### SESSION 2: Ambassador Terry Branstad

Ambassador Terry Branstad's presentation for OLLI at Drake will be as a 'fireside chat' with a moderator discussing his long history with China during his tenure as Ambassador to China from 2017 to 2020, and the relationship with China during his time as lowa's longest serving Governor and the longest-serving Governor in US history. He will address the complicated relationship between the US and China and share his insights into having China as a vital agricultural trading partner. Participants will be welcome to ask questions during this presentation.

Former US Ambassador to China Terry Branstad is the president of the World Food Prize Foundation, and the longest serving governor in the history of the United States. In addition to his role as president of Des Moines University Medical School, his public service includes election to the office of Lt. Governor and three-terms in the Iowa House of Representatives. He is a founding partner of the Branstad Churchill Group, a strategic consulting firm that provides advice, guidance and solutions to organizations, corporate leaders and investors seeking to navigate the complexities associated with conducting business in China and the United States. During his tenure as US Ambassador to China, Branstad's two greatest accomplishments included the signing of the historic Phase-One Trade Agreement in January of 2020 and successfully lobbying the Chinese government to stem the flow of fentanyl into the United States. Branstad continues his public service as the "Ambassador-In-Residence" at Drake University in Des Moines, where he received his Juris Doctorate, and as the national co-chair of the capital campaign to modernize the Herbert Hoover Presidential Library and Museum in West Branch, Iowa.

Jeff was born in Iowa and resides in downtown Des Moines.

#### Israel and the Palestinians: Is the Two-State Solution Still Viable? Hunter R. Clark Fridays, September 13, 20 2-3:30 p.m.

This course will examine the Arab-Israeli conflict, from the emergence of the modern Zionist movement through the formulation of the two-State solution. The two-State solution calls for the creation of separate Jewish and Palestinian states, living together as neighbors in peace. The course will emphasize US efforts to broker Mideast peace, which are based, most recently, on the Abraham Accords negotiated during the Trump administration. We will conclude with an assessment of the Abraham Accords' prospects for success and whether the two-State solution is still a viable option for resolving the conflict between Israel and the Palestinians.

**Professor Hunter R. Clark** joined Drake University's law faculty in 1993. He is a graduate of Harvard College, AB cum laude 1976, and Harvard Law School, JD 1979. During law school, he wrote for the *Harvard International Law Journal*, and edited the *Harvard Civil Rights-Civil Liberties Law Review*. From 1981-1986, he worked as a staff writer for *TIME Magazine*, writing weekly articles on world affairs and diplomatic developments. His writings on foreign direct investment and global economic development have appeared in leading journals and law reviews. During high school, Clark worked as a page in the US Supreme Court. He is the author of two books: *Justice Brennan: The Great Conciliator* (1995), and *Thurgood Marshall: Warrior at the Bar, Rebel on the Bench* (1994, 1992).

### Murder at the Y: A Miranda Warning Violation? Brent Appel

A family outing on Christmas Eve tragically turned into the kidnapping and murder of ten-year-old Pamela Powers. The perpetrator fled to Davenport and then turned himself in to local authorities. Des Moines Police investigators agreed they would not question the subject until he consulted with his attorney, after their return to Des Moines. Sleet and ice hindered the return trip on Interstate 80. The lead detective emphasized that, "the parents of this little girl should be entitled to a Christian burial for the little girl who was snatched away from them on Christmas (E)ve and murdered." Was the agreement the police made with the attorney broached and his client's rights violated? The answer is ultimately provided by the US Supreme Court. Join us as the attorneys involved in the case retell the story.

Our three presenters (**Brent Appel, Rob Blink,** and **Steve Foritano**) as then part of the Polk County Attorney's Office's Criminal Division, prosecuted the Pamela Powers murder case in District Court, and continued to be involved as appeals worked their way through the criminal justice system, with the case ultimately heard and affirmed by the US Supreme Court. All three presenters currently serve as lecturers at Drake Law School.

This was Walt Disney's first full-length animated feature film, released in 1937. The beauty of the hand-drawn cels is a credit to his vision and the talent of the artists he employed. It was nominated for an Academy Award in 1938 for Best Music, Score, a tradition that continues to this day. In 1939, Disney was presented with an Honorary Award: "For Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs, recognized as a significant screen innovation which has charmed millions and pioneered a great new entertainment field." He was given one statuette and seven miniature ones.

### Fantasia Revisited

In 1940, Walt Disney made a unique feature film combining classical music and animation. The result was *Fantasia*, a testament to the quality of hand-drawn animation at the Disney studio and the ability to offer live action with animation. Utilizing the Philadelphia Orchestra under the direction of legendary conductor Leopold Stokowski, with heralded music critic Deems Taylor as announcer, Disney's film was not received with the enthusiasm with which it was made. Eventually, it came to be considered a major achievement. In 1979, nearly forty years later, the Italian director Bruno Bozetto created a film, *Allegro non Troppo*, that is an homage to the Disney classic. Humorous and brilliantly artistic, it similiarly combines classical music with narration. In 2000, the Disney studio created its own sequel to the original film, *Fantasia 2000*, a worthy addition to the genre. This course will examine each film, make comparisons, and remind ourselves how imagination, creative talent, and technical skill can create unique art.

**Carl Johnson** received his undergraduate degree in music education and his teaching credential from UCLA, then spent 19 years teaching high school instrumental music in California. He moved to Urbandale in 1992 and received his master's degree in conducting from Drake University in 1994. He has taught classes in numerous adjunct and part-time capacities ever since. He is the music director/conductor of the Des Moines Community Orchestra, conducted annual musicals with the Urbandale Community Theatre, and is the assistant director of the Greater Des Moines Community Band.

#### ACCOMPLISHED BUT INSUFFICIENTLY PRAISED: Four People Who Deserve to be More Widely Known Roy Behrens Monday, October 28 Wednesdays, November 6, 13, 20 10-11:30 a.m. Class delivery mode: ZOOM Cost: \$45

This is a series of richly illustrated talks about four people whose achievements were exemplary, yet too often go unmentioned. Each talk in the series will provide an overview of the life of one of those individuals, two of whom are men, while two are women. Three of them had lowa connections. The achievements of all four were art-related, but they were unusually open to working across established disciplines, both art and science.

The subjects in the series are: (1) German-born Bauhaus-trained Master Potter Marguerite (Friedlander) Wildenhain (1896-1985), who fled to Holland with the rise of the Nazis, then emigrated to the US, and settled in Northern California. She established Pond Farm School, and became an influential figure in American studio pottery. (2) New Hampshire artist and naturalist Abbott Handerson Thayer (1849-1921), who depicted women as winged angels, researched form in nature, and collaborated with his son on a major pioneering book about protective coloration in animals. (3) Everett Longley Warner (1877-1963), an American Impressionist artist who was born in Vinton IA. He was descended from Dakota Territory missionaries, studied art in Europe, and supervised production of disruptive (or "dazzle") ship camouflage for the US Navy during both world wars. (4) Frances (Franc) Johnson Newcomb (1887-1970) was a Wisconsin-born self-trained anthropologist, who was the wife of the owner (from Manchester IA) of a trading post on the Navajo reservation (at Newcomb NM) near the Four Corners in New Mexico. She and her family lived among the Native Americans for more than two decades, during which she studied their ceremonial

sand paintings, which she documented pictorially and published several books about. She also helped to establish the Wheelwright Museum of the American Indian in Santa Fe.

**Roy R. Behrens** (b. 1946) is a graphic designer, author, and design historian who taught for more than 45 years at American art schools and universities. A selection of his essays, books, artworks, and online video talks can be found at *https://northerniowa.academia.edu/ RoyBehrens*

After joining Team USA in Budapest, Hungary and Riga, Latvia in 2023, learn about the differences and similarities between these major championships and what it is like to travel with a full team of teenagers to a country with a Level 2 Travel Advisory from the US State Department.

Blake Boldon was named the 12th Franklin P. Johnson Director of the Drake Relays in October, 2016. Entering his eighth year in this role, he also serves as a Senior Associate Athletic Director at Drake University. Under his leadership, the Drake Relays have become a cornerstone of the World Athletics Continental Tour in North America while also forging community partnerships with organizations like Adaptive Sports Iowa, Special Olympics Iowa and others. In 2023, Boldon was an event manager for Team USA at the World Athletics Championships in Budapest, Hungary and the Men's Coach at the World Athletics Road Running Championships in Riga, Latvia. He currently serves as the Chair of the NCAA Track and Field and Cross Country Committee, the Chair of Men's Long Distance Running for USATF and on the board of directors for the Iowa Sports Foundation. Prior to arriving at Drake, Boldon spent five years as the Executive Director of the Indianapolis Monumental Marathon, following a successful stint as a collegiate coach, including roles at Iowa State, University of Alabama Birmingham and the University of Pennsylvania. In 2007, Boldon became the third Iowa native to break the 4:00 barrier for the mile.

Audience participation welcomed. The **Pfeiffer sisters (Jackie and Janine)** are both graduates of North Dakota State University. Their story personally reflects the events of that decade as they grew up on a North Dakota farm in the 1950s.

Presently, world traveler and adventurer **Jackie** lives near Colville, WA, with husband, Bob. The two retirees spend much of their time volunteering and enjoying the outdoor activities of hiking and kayaking in northeastern Washington. Many of Janine's days start in her bakery, the hub of her local and online business, Miss NiNi's Fine Desserts. Two married daughters and four grandchildren complete their family.

### The Traditions and Ceremonies of Japanese Culture Yoko Tanaka Mondays, November 11, 18, 25 2-3:30 p.m.

This course will provide an overview of Japanese culture. It will be divided into three sessions presenting the Tea Ceremony, the background and regimen of dressing in a kimono, the music of Japan, and the significance of origami. These will be offered in person in order to take full advantage of immersion possibilities.

**SESSION 1:** This session will present the class with the story behind the tea ceremony, the philosophy of it, and the experience of the protocols involved in both making and receiving the tea. (*Please note: participants will not be drinking tea, as this session is to observe the cultural ceremony of traditional Japanese tea preparation.*)

**SESSION 2:** The proper way to wear a kimono and the meaning behind its various parts will be shown by properly dressing up a model.

**SESSION 3**: Traditional music of Japan will be presented. The Japanese musical scale will be explained and samples of music will be heard. The class will get to see and hear a Taisho koto, a 20th century invention drawing on the koto, a traditional stringed instrument that is one of the most prominent in Japanese music. If possible, the class will also get the opportunity to be shown how to do origami. Three important points in doing origami will be discussed, as well as how it involves experimenting with two-dimensional paper in three dimensions.

Yoko Tanaka is the Executive Director of Japan American Society of Iowa (JASI). As a CultureAll Ambassador, she has been sharing her culture with participants of all ages since 2005. A Japanese interpreter, musician, performer, and artist, Yoko practices "ichigo ichie" or cherish every moment since it will never recur. She recognizes that each instant is important and should not be wasted. She also values the care for others. In her free time, Yoko loves playing musical instruments.

During the US. Civil War, the Northern public had a surprising outet for processing traumatic events: magic lantern shows. These multi-media spectacles were built around the projection of colorful designs in darkened theaters and assembly rooms. Such displays were accompanied by sound: music, narration, or other audio effects. While nineteenth-century magic lantern shows often featured famous works of art, travel narratives, or stories from the Christian Bible, they also began to present warrelated imagery after the outbreak of conflict in 1861. Acts of Projection encompasses both the material artifacts of lantern shows – hand-painted slides and period projectors – as well as actual projections to simulate the original viewing experience. This session will offer a tour of the exhibition, including hearing from Drake students who acted as its cocurators.

Lilah Anderson has served as the Anderson Gallery Exhibitions and Community Engagement Manager at Drake University since October 2021. In her role, she directs the Gallery, works with faculty, students and artists to curate exhibitions, and develops programming and outreach. Lilah has curated and collaborated on exhibitions on a range of topics as well as produced countless programs. She strives to foster community and cultivate cross-disciplinary engagement in art spaces. She earned her MS in History of Art, Theory and Display from the University of Edinburgh and her BA from Bard College with a double major in Art History and Biology.

This presentation focuses on the recently published book *Broadlawns: A Century of Caring.* In what is believed to be the first comprehensive book about the healthcare facility, it documents the rich history and curated stories that illuminate Broadlawns over the course of the last century, from 1924 to 2024. The medical center has persisted through the worst of times and the best of times, tending to the people of Polk County, Iowa. Originally established as a tuberculosis hospital, today it has transformed into a facility that comprehensively meets peoples' healthcare needs by providing access to high quality care at lower financial costs. Come discover how Broadlawns was able to survive hard times and emerge as one of the best public hospitals in the nation.

Jean Logan is a nurse, a researcher and an educator who, as an elected official served two six-year terms on the Broadlawns Board of Trustees. During her tenure on the board, she was twice elected chairperson. Dr. Logan holds a PhD from Iowa State University, and she was a Professor of Nursing at Grand View University for many years. While she was a faculty member she helped design the Caring Curriculum, which influenced the title of the book.

From seeing Babe Ruth in his uniform at Yankee Stadium, witnessing Richard Nixon resign the presidency at the White House, and being present at the fall of Saigon; to his being shot at in Gaza, singing Danny Boy with Sir Paul McCartney at the Nobel Peace Prize and meeting with Xi Jinping in San Francisco last November. Just like Forrest Gump the movie character, Ambassador Quinn, the former lowa diplomat and President Emeritus of the World Food Prize, somehow keeps showing up.

Ambassador Kenneth Quinn is a graduate of Loras College in Dubuque, holds a master's degree in Political Science from Marquette University and a PhD in International Relations from the University of Maryland. He was only the 23rd recipient of the Iowa Medal, the state's highest citizen award. Other honors include: the State Department Award for Heroism; being the only civilian to ever earn the Army Air Medal for participating in helicopter combat operations; and acting as interpreter in Vietnamese for President Ford.

#### Ralph Vaughan Williams and His World Eric Saylor Tuesdays, December 10, 17 10–11:30 a.m. Class delivery mode: IN PERSON Location: Harkin Institute Cost: \$30

Ralph Vaughan Williams (1872–1958) was one of the most prolific and influential British composers of the twentieth century. This short survey will consider not only his life and music, but broader social and cultural aspects of Britain between the Victorian Era and the New Elizabethan Age that shaped his personal biography and professional career.

**Eric Saylor** is a leading specialist on British art music of the later nineteenth and twentieth centuries. Dr. Saylor is the author of the award-winning biography *Vaughan Williams* (Oxford University Press, 2022) and *English Pastoral Music: From Arcadia to Utopia, 1900–1955* (University of Illinois Press, 2017), as well as numerous scholarly essays and book chapters. He is a professor of music history at Drake.

This course will acquaint you with the Native American flute in the most personal way possible, by playing it. Experience a 90-minute lesson (flutes provided) during which you'll learn the simplest steps for playing the instrument, how to hold it, how to blow, and basic fingering and tonguing techniques. The end game: Determine whether you enjoy the flute experience and provide resources to start you on the fluteplaying journey. Participants will be able to sample flutes.

Judy Olson retired after 40 years of teaching English, Speech, Drama, and Debate (and coaching) at Valley High School. Now, she writes, speaks, performs music, and practices energy healing arts. Growing up near Standing Rock reservation in South Dakota, she was drawn to Native American thought and culture. She played the transverse flute in high school and college. In 2002, she found the Native American flute and fell in love with it.


